# **World Understanding:**

- Project C.H.E.A.R was narrowly voted in as our World Understanding Project.
- C.H.E.A.R. (Children's Home with Education and Agriculture a Reality)Making a Children's Home with Education and Agriculture a Reality in Tanzania
- **Project C.H.E.A.R.'s** mission is to *empower* disadvantaged children and youth in Babati, Tanzania through *education*. We are the only service of its kind in a region of 1.4 million. CHEAR will allow us to complete a 44 bed children's home and build a school with a library technology center. We serve underachieving and illiterate children living in our rented Centre and the community. Certified teachers instruct our students. Establishing agricultural areas containing gardens, fruit trees, and livestock will promote life-skills and long-term self-sustainability. Making this pioneer project a reality frees our children from a life of poverty.

### **Altruism:**

- We will continue to support St. Jude Children's Hospital
- We will continue to support Alzheimer's Association.
- It was announced that Alpha Delta Kappa gave \$70,000 over this past biennium to both St. Jud and Alzheimer's Association.
