My thoughts of November are on blessings...What are your blessings? Family? Pets? Friendship? Sisterhood? Or maybe more materialistic items like House, Car, Camper, Trailer, Jewelry, etc...My husband Joe and I live on acreage a little way outside of Paola, Kansas. We are about 40 minutes south of Kansas City metro area. Some say we live out in the boonies... *but we love it*.

Each year at this time, we collect walnuts with our daughter and family to trade in for cash that they use for holiday time(s) coming up. While the walnuts are falling so are the native pecan trees in our yard. We have 5-7 walnut trees and 5-7 pecan tree. In other words...a LOT! My daughter reported that she took in over 7,500 pounds of walnuts into the walnut stand!!!



As I was picking up pecans over the last week, I was imagining the blessings that each little native pecan gives us...pecan pies for the holidays to enjoy, pecans for giving yams, cookies, candies, breads, cinnamon or caramel rolls an extra burst of flavor while the extra pecans are frozen for later usage.

Just like the picking up of the pecans, there is a process we use: pick, crack, blow, then package them up. Once after picking up pecans we packaged them up. I then take them to our own Barb Corder's husband, Roger for picking out of the shell. They are then repacked and put into smaller packages for the freezer. During the summer, we use the pecans we pick from this year, for pies for the local fair in our neighboring county for a group sponsoring the free fair which our grandchildren participate in.

Now I know you are asking...how does this pretain to Kansas and $A\Delta K$? Well, while picking pecans, I was noticing that I was excited to find more hidden... (Do you find six pecans in this picture? This is the same setting as above.)



Isn't this the way we find new members that we call sisters? Don't you get excited about what you are doing in your chapter meetings? Don't you get creative in the ways altruism is handled? Don't you share what you have learned from

programs given at your chapter meetings with others not in A Δ K? Doesn't you smile and sharing of A Δ K make you happy and content?



Accessing your profile on the Alpha Delta Kappa International website is easy!

- Click "Sign In" in the upper right hand corner.
- Enter your username, which is most likely your last name followed by your member ID number. (You can find your member ID number on your *KAPPAN* mailing label.)
- Enter your password. If you don't know it, click "Forgot password?" and you will be emailed
 a link to create a new one provided we have your current, correct email address in our
 database.
- Once you have logged in, you will see a large banner across the home page saying "Click here to go to your profile."





Paying Dues

Don't forget that international dues can be paid on line using your credit card and/or PayPal. These are due by December 31, 2021.

If you have not yet paid your International dues, clicking on your profile will give you the option to pay online. You do not need your invoice to pay your dues, as your profile will show the amount you owe.

Just so you know the state President, VP for Membership, State Treasurer, Chapter President and Chapter Treasurer will receive notification on Jan. 1, Feb. 1, and March 1 on who has not paid their dues. *Remember there is a \$5 late fee happening for International dues (not State dues) starting on January 1, 2022*

By Laws Changes????

Well, if you've been wondering about Bylaws and or Policies and procedures, here's an update. There are a lot of changes to make, but not right away. All will need to review their Policies and Procedures to make sure they follow the International Bylaws. Kansas uses Policies and Procedures instead

of Bylaws. There are some additions to all our Policies and Procedures, both chapter and state to make. I will be happy to help you through this. The good news is that this doesn't have to be done right away. The State has until Oct. 15, 2022. The Chapters have until March 15, 2023. I still have some investigating to do, but please don't redo or rewrite anything yet. There is still more time, and I will work on the state's update and then start on Chapters. The new templates are on the website under documents if you want to look and see. All this will happen officially after our StateConvention in May.

Innovated Grants

The Alpha Delta Kappa Innovation Grant is designed to assist creative, innovative educators who are not members of Alpha Delta Kappa with the cost of materials and services that enhance classroom lessons. What an excellent way to introduce women educators to Alpha Delta Kappa. The scope of this grant does not include coursework or professional development opportunities. This grant was developed for teachers with ten years of experience or less who display characteristics of excellent educators. The Innovation Grant will be awarded annually to a maximum of five recipients for each of the seven Alpha Delta Kappa regions. The eligibility stated in the grant is:

Eligibility:

The Applicant

- 1. shall be recommended by a current Alpha Delta Kappa member.
- 2. shall exhibit creative and innovative teaching practices.
- 3. shall be actively engaged in teaching or the education field.
- 4. shall have no more than ten years of teaching experience.
- 5. is not related to a member of the current International Executive Board, International Chapter, International, and Regional scholarship boards, or International and Regional scholarship committees.
- 6. has not received an International Alpha Delta Kappa scholarship or grant within the past two years.
- 7. shall have a minimum score of 85% for the criteria on the adjudication form to be a recipient.

APPLICATION INCLUDES:

- 1. Completed online application.
- 2. Letter (electronic format) of nomination from a current Alpha Delta Kappa member, describing excellence in the classroom, innovation, and creativity of nominee. (Don't hesitate to visit with the principal.)

Education: The Ever-Changing Roles of Educators by Cindy Apple,

Kansas Fraternity Education Chairman

The last three years has seen immense changes in education. We now have hybrid, virtual and blended options. Terms like social distancing and mask breaks are commonly used daily. I wanted to share a history of how education has

evolved over the years and found a simple and fun article/blog highlighting some of the changes.

America's public schools can be traced to the year 1640. Massachusetts Puritans established schools to teach basic reading, writing and arithmetic skills, and cultivate values serving a democratic society. The implication was that some history and civics was taught.

- From 1900 to 1910, nutrition, immunizations, and health were added to the list of school responsibilities.
- From 1910 to 1930, the following were added: physical education, including organized activities. Practical arts such as woodworking, needlework. Vocational education, including home economics and agricultural education. Additionally school transportations began to be mandated.
- In the 1940s, business education, art, music, speech and drama were added. Also, half day kindergarten and school lunch programs appeared. This was a significant shift to the schools doing the job of feeding American's children 1/3 of their daily meals.
- In the 1950s, expanded science and math education, safety education, driver's education, expanded music and art education, foreign language requirements were strengthened. Sex education was introduced.
- In the 1960s, advanced placement programs started. As well as, Head Start, Title I, adult education, consumer education, career education, peace, leisure and recreation education.
- In the 1970s: Special Education mandated by the Federal Government. Title IX programs (greatly expanded athletic programs for girls). Drug and alcohol abuse education, parent education, behavior adjustment classes, character education, environmental education, women's students, African-American heritage education and school breakfast programs appeared.
- In the 1980s: Keyboarding and computer education, global education, ethnic education, multicultural/non-sexist education, English as a second language, and bilingual education, teen pregnancy awareness, Hispanic heritage education, early childhood education, Jump-Start,


Early Start, Even Start, and Prime Start, full day kindergarten, preschool programs for children at risk, after school programs for children of working parents, alternative education in all its forms, stranger/danger education, anti-smoking education, sexual abuse prevention education, health and psychological services were expanded and child abuse monitoring became a legal requirement for all teachers.

 In the 1990s: Conflict resolution and peer mediation, HIV?AIDS education, CPR training, death education, expanded computer and Internet education, tech prep and school to work programs, gang education (in urban centers), bus safety, bicycle safety, gun safety and water safety education.

Since 2000, we have seen major shifts in education legislature, funding and curriculum. However, one thing that has stayed the same is that our kids still need us. No matter what gets put on our shoulders, teachers are the strongest in the workforce!


